

Silk Painting Workshop

25 February 2017

The workshop this Saturday was enjoyed by all and hopefully the pictures have captured the beauty of what we all created with such artistic flair. Since joining the guild my interest in all things spinning, weaving, and knitting has grown to incorporate many more very different crafts, and today was no different.

Some of the group bought their own silk with them, while others worked with the material Jenny bought for the group. This was more along the lines of a voile type material. While silk allows the paint to bleed and flow more easily, we improvised and drew on Jenny's expertise to produce a similar outcome. Jenny was very knowledgeable and encouraging. There were samplers that Jenny had bought to show the group; Jenny has attended workshops with the very talented Sue Townsend and her work is truly very beautiful.






When working on an art project the medium I favour is working with pencils but working with Jenny's gentle encouragement I started to experiment and draw motivation from her and the rest of the group. My firework piece was my favourite, which was in fact the first piece I worked on. I returned to this piece throughout the workshop to add colours, using different brush strokes to change the shapes and dimensions of the original silk painting, allowing the painting to morph to its finish. The background you place your final piece of work against changes your creation, a dark background strengthens and deepens the colours, where a light background creates a delicacy and softness.

Walking around and seeing the silk painting of the others in the group, the talent was incredible and quite humbling too. Others' work spanned from abstract to fine art, and the beauty in the shapes, colours and styles was inspiring. My thanks go to Jenny and the whole group for making this an enjoyable experience and another wonderful day at the Guild.

And she excelled at making rugs using her large Glimakra loom. She joined the Hallamshire Guild and progressed onto other textile media, one of which was tassel making. And what tassels they were! She was very generous with her knowledge and I have some lovely tassels, which I made at one of her classes.

We were very lucky when she joined the Notts Guild because there were only a few weavers at the time and she brought new ideas and enthusiasm to the group. She will be truly missed.

I hope we get invited again. Nottinghamshire Wildlife are happy and friendly people, and it's a good day out!



Huge thanks to Patricia for organising the event, and to all those who went along to represent the Guild.




The Industrial Museum at Wollaton Hall
